Congregational letter

This is my command: love each other."

"Want a friend?"

This is the theme of this year's Fall Kickoff, on September 15, when our new ministry year begins. It was suggested to me by one of you, and to me it seemed perfect for this time of year! We are all gearing up for new experiences: for some a new grade or even a new school, for others (like me) a new role or a new job, for all of us a new season that always comes with a new rhythm and energy. But all that newness can be scary as well as exciting. Having a friend – or a few – can be the difference between coping and caving, between feeling hopeful or despairing.

Sadly, more and more people feel like they don't have anyone around them that they can count on. According to the World Health Organization, loneliness is a "global public health concern". Some call it an epidemic. Finding friends, making friends, is not as simple as it once was – even at church.

Addressing this problem is tricky, since our culture has trained us to value individual freedom above community, that friendship is

mostly based on shared interests and personal chemistry. In other words, the world reinforces our instinct that feelings are what's most important, and that a true friend is someone with whom we feel an instant connection.

But look up. Up to the top of the page.

Read the quote again – Jesus' words – slowly.

Jesus' thoughts on friendship are ... different.

Who is a true friend, according to Jesus? Is it someone with whom you have a lot in common? No, it's someone who puts the needs of others first and obeys his command to love. Is a friend someone you know so well you never feel awkward? No, it's someone who knows the Father's "business" and gets down to doing it.

So what does this mean for our church?

It means Bethesda ought to be a place where people practice loving one another well. It means that we communicate that Jesus expects us to share life together. It means we provide opportunities for people to come together. It means we foster deep and tender friendships by

first making everyday, "glancing" interactions possible. What do I mean by that, exactly?

Deep friendship blooms when you are least expecting it. It germinates in between other things. That is, lasting friendships grow bit by bit, usually not when you're consciously trying to make friends but when you're doing stuff – serving, learning, playing, worshipping – together. As you put others' needs before your own, friendship can't help but flower: slowly but surely, what seemed like throw away gestures and dustings of conversation actually enrich the ground of trust so that the deeper friendships that we all hunger for take root ... and bear fruit.

To put it another way, we all need to abandon the search for the people we think will meet our needs, and focus on how we can best love the people that God brings across our path, no matter who they are. We need to trust God to bring us friends who will put us first just as we put them first. Our fear, of course, is that our needs won't be met, that we might give more than we receive. But indulging that fear is the main reason we are so lonely: when we put ourselves first we push others away; we make sure that we will be alone in the long run. Instead, we need to lay down our lives. We need to remember that *Jesus* said "it is more blessed [literally, *happy*] to give than to receive"!

So, again, what does this mean for our church? For you? It means – for the sake of *your own happiness* (no less than your holiness) – that you participate in the life of our church – even when that seems scary, or dull, or unappealing.

And so this fall I invite you to make the church's activities your weekly priority. Our Sunday morning worship services will now be about an hour long so that we can regularly bring the whole worshipping community together at once. But don't stop there, come at other times as well! Like when we plan special events: the dinner in appreciation of Pastor Mark and Shelly on September 6, or Bethesda's 80th Anniversary Celebration on October 20th, or youth activities, or the new Friday Bethesda Fun Nights! Come to the activities we are continung from last year, like Fellowship Meals every Sunday after church, or Baking Club, or Men's Breakfasts, or Men's Prayer Meeting, or the new Sunday morning Faith Formation class called Faith @ Work which is designed to help us all get to know one another better while encouraging one another too! And of course, I strongly encourage you all to attend the Wednesday Bible Study and Prayer Meeting. This is Bethesda's small group, the best
